FEMP Federal Financing Specialists

FEMP's Federal Financing Specialists (FFSs) can answer agencies' questions about financed Federal energy projects and can help agencies access FEMP resources. An FFS will:

- Explain performance contracting to site staff and management
- Determine whether an ESPC project is feasible considering all available procurement vehicles
- Form an agency acquisition team
- Identify agency project decision makers

FEMP Project Facilitators

FEMP project facilitators are experienced, unbiased advisors who guide agencies through ESPC project development and implementation and the first annual measurement & verification report. Project facilitators' assistance includes tasks such as:

- Providing consultation and assistance with:
 - Contractual and financial issues
 - Technology and engineering issues
 - Measurement and verification (M&V)
- Reviewing cost and technical proposals, and
- Drafting the agency's task order request for proposal

FEMP ESPC Project Assistance for Agencies

FEMP provides project facilitators at no cost for the early development of ESPC projects — through agency review of the ESCO's preliminary assessment. After that point, services are provided on a reimbursable basis through an interagency agreement with the DOE Golden Field Office. Contact a Federal financing specialist to get started.

Advanced Technologies for ESPCs

In accordance with new legislation and a growing national focus on energy security and independence, the new DOE ESPCs emphasize renewable energy and advanced energy efficiency technologies.

Coordinated by an FFS before ESPC project development starts, and at no cost to the agency, the FEMP project facilitator and FEMP ESPC Core Team — experts from the DOE National Laboratories — help agency personnel identify economically feasible renewable energy and advanced energy efficiency technologies that can be included as energy conservation measures (ECMs) in an ESPC project.

FEMP helps Federal agencies identify and plan for opportunities to deploy these technologies using two new tools:

- The Renewable Energy Screening Tool
- The Emerging Technologies Matrix
