> Rima Oueid: EECBG & SEP Technical Assistance Program, Department of Energy

Rima Oueid is a Policy Advisor for DOE's State Energy Program (SEP) and serves as the liaison to the Technical Assistance Program (TAP). Rima is responsible for providing policy and operations guidance for SEP with a focus on financing and renewable energy programs. In addition, Rima manages the stakeholder relationships for SEP and is the SEP liaison to other EERE technology offices. Rima is dedicated to helping state energy officials obtain the tools and capabilities needed to build clean energy capacity in their communities by leveraging TAP and DOE resources. Prior to joining the DOE, Rima spent nine years working in private equity and management consulting where she evaluated and led investments in renewable energy and energy conservation companies such as solar, biomass, and water purification. Rima earned an MBA from the University Of Chicago Booth School Of Business with concentrations in Finance, Strategy, and Entrepreneurship. Rima also holds a Bachelors of Science in Accounting from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

➤ **John MacLean:** *Managing Director, Energy Efficiency Finance Corp.*

John MacLean's background is investment banking in municipal and project finance for energy and environmental projects. John has 26 years commercial finance experience with a wide range of investment structures for senior debt, municipal bond, leasing, factoring, subordinated debt, guarantees, project equity and corporate equity transactions and has worked on financing energy efficiency projects and companies throughout his career. His clients have included commercial and development financial institutions, energy services companies, utilities, public agencies and state and local governments on project development, procurement and finance assignments. For the last twelve years, he has worked internationally as a financial advisor with the International Finance Corp., World Bank, Asian Development Bank, United Nations Environment Program and others to develop, structure and implement energy efficiency and renewable energy investments and finance programs. He graduated from Yale University in 1980 in economics and teaches sustainable economics and political economy at The Evergreen State College and Bainbridge Graduate Institute.

She holds an M.A. in environmental policy from the University of Colorado at Boulder, and a B.A. in economics from Lehigh University.

The EECE program has provided grants to local governments, non-profit organizations, utilities, and the state's Housing Finance Commission who partner with financial institutions to create lending programs for residential and commercial energy efficiency projects by funding credit enhancements that reduce lender risks and borrower costs. Prior to getting involved in energy finance, Liz managed the Bond Cap Allocation Program and Bond Users Clearinghouse for five years, also at the Department of Commerce.

➤ Charlie Stephens: Northwest Energy Efficiency Alliance

Charlie Stephens joined the Northwest Energy Efficiency Alliance (NEEA) in July 2010 as a Senior Codes & Standards Engineer, representing the energy efficiency interests of NEEA's funders in federal and state energy efficiency standards processes, and helping to align the work of NEEA's Emerging Technologies and Sector Initiatives with the region's codes and standards objectives. From 2006 to 2010, Charlie was a consultant for architects and project owners building high performance and net zero energy homes. From 1989 to 2006, he was at the Oregon Department of Energy where he focused on residential energy efficiency and renewable energy applications, new technology development, sustainable building and community development, and energy policy for the State of Oregon. He created the State's Sustainable Building Tax Credit Program (1999), and was a design team member for a significant number of sustainable building projects. In 2001, he began the Department's work on high performance homes, designed to generate as much energy annually as they use. He is a past member of the U.S. Secretary of Energy's Advisory Committee on Appliance Energy Efficiency Standards.
